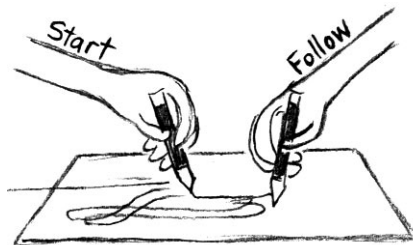

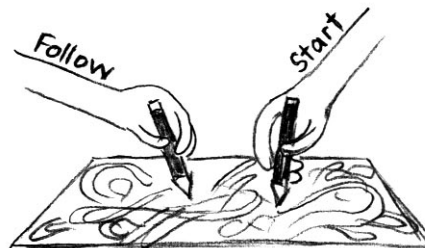
STEP 1: Partner and Begin

Find a partner and select two crayons of different colors. 1st child begins a slow scribble while the 2nd child "follows" with his crayon.



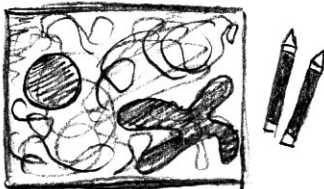
STEP 2: Take turns Scribble Chasing

Take turns. Now the 2nd child scribbles while the 1st child follows. Working together this way, fill paper with scribbles.



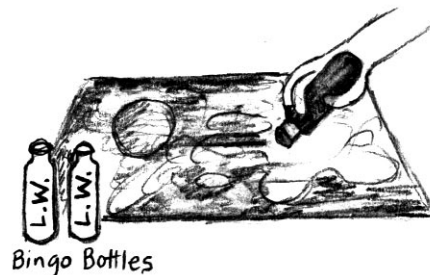
STEP 3: Find Two Images

Study scribble with your partner and find two objects or images in your picture. Outline and "color in" these 2 images with more crayon.



STEP 4: Cover with Paint

Using Liquid Watercolor™ in Bingo bottles, work together to cover entire paper with color. Wax crayon will



CLASSROOM TIPS

Extensions

Make a group mural, using white butcher paper and having children take turns, two at a time. Create a paper quilt: Pre-cut paper into squares beforehand, then tape together with colored masking tape. Try using BioColor® Foam Paint instead of Liquid Watercolor™ on the top— it works great! Create a picture/story: have the children dictate a story then display both together. Mount art on colored paper. For easy mounting, prep paper ahead by cutting 1/2" from sides—then mount on colored paper with staples, and hang right away!
